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## Preface

The Township of Haverford Police Department for the past twenty years has been undergoing a philosophic transformation. This transformation continued throughout 2009. In an effort to better serve our community the department has moved from a reactive police force to a proactive department that works in partnership with the community. The goal of this partnership is to deliver the highest level of police service possible to Haverford Township, its residents, businesses and the citizens of our larger community. This annual report is a reflection of our efforts.

This year continued to bring change to the police department, most notably in the Information Technologies area. The department added new technology to the police vehicles to allow officers more access to information during traffic stops. A green network using virtual servers was created, allowing a decrease in electric use. The department updated essential police personnel with smart phones for better communication. Digital video cameras were installed in patrol vehicles with state of the art recording, replacing outdated VCR recorders. The training room was fitted with a new smart board for training of all departments. Building and parking lot security was upgraded by the installation of upgraded internal surveillance equipment. Improvements were made to the department's virtual private network (VPN) allowing officers to access the department network from the mobile data terminals (MDT) in the patrol vehicles. The IT staff was able to merge police data to one central location and create several electronic forms to improve accessibility, allowing patrol officers to do more in-depth traffic stops and back ground checks. The IT department was also instrumental in training police officers on how to remove video from surveillance equipment at crime scenes.

A review of the 2009 Crime statistics for the Police Department revealed a 6% decrease in crimes reported and a 17% increase in traffic violations cited. These statistics support Chief Pettine's philosophy of visible patrol being the biggest crime deterrent. Chief Pettine has stated "You can't take someone's desire away to commit a crime; but you can take away the opportunity." The Chief has instituted programs to provide more officers on the street conducting proactive patrol thereby helping to reduce the opportunity for criminal behavior.

Chief Pettine continues to push for the department to move forward into the 21<sup>st</sup> century, by enhancing the department's ability to utilize effective crime reduction strategies. This goal will be achieved by providing officers with the best available equipment, training and programs that enable them to provide a level of service and protection that the residents of Haverford Township have come to rely on.

## Mission Statement

The mission of the Haverford Township Police Department is to improve the quality of life throughout the Township by providing a secure community environment through the delivery of police services in an efficient and effective manner.

We, the Haverford Township Police Department, are dedicated to protecting all persons, and fostering a positive relationship of cooperation and understanding between the Police Department and the citizens of Haverford Township.

We shall strive to establish a climate of mutual respect and trust through positive interaction with citizens of the community and by maintaining a community oriented policing philosophy.

## Departmental Organization and Staffing

*The Department has three divisions and a total complement of one hundred and fifty sworn and civilian personnel.*

**T**he Township of Haverford Board of Commissioners established a Night Watch and Police Force June 5, 1916. When Ordinance number 77 of 1916 passed it did “ordain” the Night Watch and Police Force would consist of one Chief of Police and not more than nine Policemen, one of whom may be appointed Sergeant of Police.

**Our Departmental history** shows the first Chief, Edward F. Hallisey, and the five officers initially hired did not have long lived or prosperous careers. The Chief left the Department after only three years and ten months of service. His first recruits fared far worse. The first officer hired by the Township, George T. Neeli lasted ten days and the second officer hired completed four months. This four month stint was three months longer than any of his fellow hires.

Ordinance number 77 also outlined the officers’ duties. “Policemen shall patrol their respective beats during all of the time they are on duty and shall be governed in making arrests of all drunken, disorderly and suspicious persons by the laws of this Commonwealth, and by the Ordinances and Regulations of the Township. It shall also be the duty of Policemen to inspect the street lights maintained by the Township and to immediately report any lights not in good order and further to inspect all poles, lines and overhead wires and all streets and roads containing water, gas or other pipe-lines and to immediately report any defects therein or dangerous condition caused thereby...”

**Today** our Department consists of one Chief of Police, sixty nine sworn officers and eighty civilian personnel. The civilian personnel consist of five information assistants, one administrative assistant, one records office manager, two secretaries, two full time records clerks, two part time records clerks, five part time parking enforcement officers and sixty-two crossing guards. Of the sixty nine officers one is a Deputy Chief, three are Lieutenants, twelve are Sergeants and fifty-three are Police Officers.

Over the last twenty-six years this Department has hired 93 officers. All of those hires have either retired or remain actively employed by the department with the exception of eighteen officers. Those officers served an average of 6  $\frac{3}{4}$  years with the three longest serving officers completing 16 years of service. Seven of the officers left the department to work for other Law Enforcement agencies.

In 2009 we saw the retirement of two Patrol Officers. Officer Robert Parker and Officer William Shields served their last day of duty on January 5<sup>th</sup> 2009 after completing twenty-five years of dedicated service. Officer Shields was provided a "Last Ride" police escort from his home to the police station on his final day. This is a new tradition implemented by Chief Pettine. The "Last Ride" is a tribute to the retiring officer and a means of letting the community know one of "It's Finest" is on his way to work for the final time. The Department has a small retirement ceremony at the station where the Officers are presented with a plaque and their retirement badge.

In the last one hundred years not only has officer retention drastically improved but the education and certification the officers possess is unprecedented in our department history. In 2009 our sixty nine officers completed six thousand five hundred and fifty-five hours of police education.

The department has had twelve Chiefs and three hundred and forty seven officers. Carmen D. Pettine is the twelfth Chief of Police for Haverford Township. Chief Pettine has a strong belief in community based policing and continues to move our department forward from the Night Watch mentality of the first eighty years of our history to an even more proactive, partnership based community policing model we operate under today.

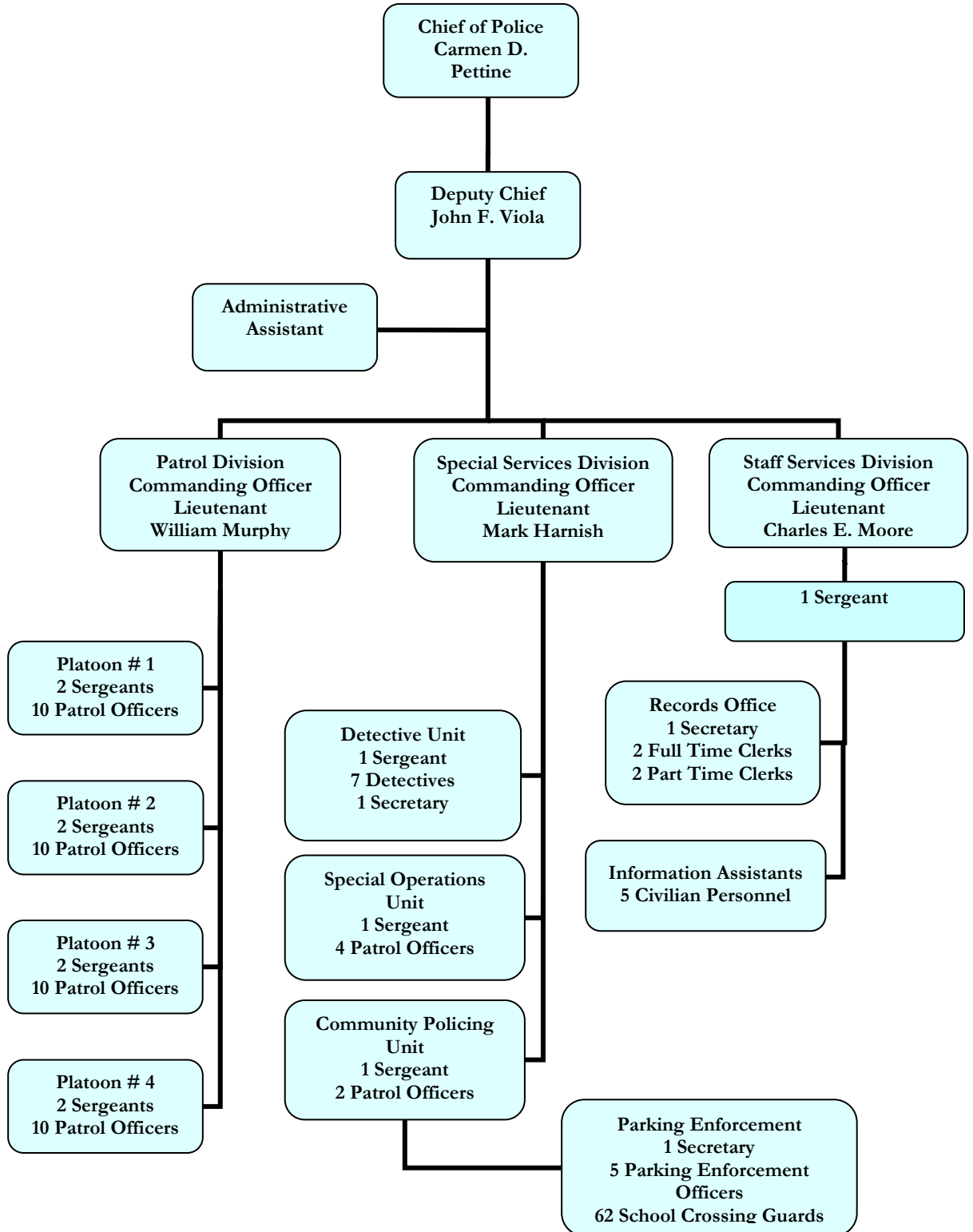

## Patrol Division

**T**he Patrol Division is the backbone of the Haverford Township Police Department. It is tasked with carrying out the basic functions of the police department. While every member of the department is sworn to protect life and property, prevent crime, and arrest violators of the law, it is the members of the patrol division that help to accomplish these goals through routine patrol of geographical areas, responding to emergency and non emergency calls for service, investigating traffic collisions, enforcing the motor vehicle laws, and handling other requests for police services. The patrol division is on duty twenty four hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed by two Lieutenants, eight Sergeants, and forty patrol officers.

**A manpower distribution plan** is used by the Department. The plan utilizes multiple districts along with overlapping sectors. This plan allows the officer assigned to a district to maximize their time in the assigned district. This is accomplished by assigning the sector officer to the back-up role rather than bringing another district officer out of his district to back a fellow district officer.

The plan allows the Department to keep the officers who patrol a district familiar with the people and issues occurring in that district. An Officer is generally assigned to the same district or sector for an extended period of time so they become familiar with the activity in the area. The approach fosters a better working relationship between the community and the officers that can lead to an ownership mentality around the unique issues in their area.

**The Police Department hired** six new Police Officers between January 2009 and December 2009. Officer Joseph McGibney, Officer William Albertus, Officer Robert McCreight, Officer Thomas McDermott, Officer Matthew DeSanctis and Officer Kenneth Campbell were all hired in July 2009. Officers McGibney, Albertus and McCreight were assigned to the police department Field Training Officer Program. The Field Training Program is a ten (10) week program designed to prepare a Probationary Police Officer to perform the duties of a police officer in Haverford Township. The officers are required to successfully complete a series of performance standards and tasks evaluated by Field Training Officers (FTO) assigned to instruct the new officers in the methods necessary to perform

these standards and tasks satisfactorily. Once the new officers successfully completed the FTO program they were assigned to a squad in the Patrol Division.

Officers McDermott, DeSanctis and Campbell were assigned to Delaware County Community College Police Academy to receive the required Municipal Police Officers Education and Training Commission certification. They graduated from the Academy in December 2009 and were then assigned to the Field Training Officer Program.

## Special Services Division

**T**he Special Services Division is commanded by one Lieutenant who is responsible for four separate elements; the Detective Unit, the Special Operations Unit and the Community Policing Unit, along with the Parking Enforcement Office. The Special Services Division Lieutenant is also the Critical Incident Team Commander.

### Detective Unit

**The Detective Unit** is currently comprised of Detective Sergeant Daniel Wallower, Detective Mark Johnson, Detective George Christake, Detective Matthew Hufnal, Detective Jere Goodman, There were three new Detectives appointed to the Unit to fill vacancies which were created by the retirement of three detectives in 2008. In October 2009, Detective Eugene Dolan, Detective Thomas Long and Detective Stephen Laughlin were transferred into the unit. The Detective Unit is under the command of Lieutenant Mark Harnish and conducts follow up investigations on all major crimes occurring in Haverford Township, as well as investigations into other suspicious or criminal activities having sufficient information or evidence which could culminate in an arrest or a clearance of the incident. During the year 2009 the Detective Unit conducted follow up investigations on 313 incidents culminating in the clearance of 171 of those crimes or incidents.

**This year** the Detective Unit investigated 13 Robberies and cleared 7 of these crimes and determined that 2 were unfounded. There were 12 sex offenses investigated, resulting in 9 clearances, including one arrest and conviction. There were 16 assault incidents investigated resulting in the clearance of 15 of these crimes with 10 arrests. There were 9 drug offenses investigated by the Detectives resulting in the clearance of 7 of these incidents and the arrest of 9 individuals. There were 66 thefts investigated by the Detectives resulting in 38 clearances, and 27 arrests. Through exhaustive hard work the Detectives served 4 search warrants resulting in 4 arrests, 20 cases were cleared including 6 in Marple Township and 3 in Lower Merion Township and the recovery of property of 7 of the victims. The 4 individuals were prowling the Townships for unlocked vehicles and taking money, compact discs, GPS systems and any other items of value that could be

easily be sold for money and or drugs. Burglaries remain the number one major crime occurring in Haverford Township. The very nature of this crime makes the crime extremely difficult to clear as little evidence leading to the identity of the suspect(s) is left at the scene. In 2009 there were 69 burglaries reported with 23 of these crimes culminating in clearances resulting in 23 arrests.

**Juvenile criminal investigations** are also conducted by the Detective Unit. During the year 2009, fifty (50) juveniles were petitioned to juvenile court with charges ranging from assault to burglary, theft and drug violations. The Detectives also conduct investigation into missing juveniles reported to the Police Department. Another important function of the Division is the referral of juveniles to the Youth Aid Panel Program. This program is designed to divert first time juvenile offenders away from the formal juvenile court system. The program is applicable to any first time juvenile offender who has committed a relatively minor offense such as a curfew violation, some vandalisms, retail theft, underage drinking, etc. During the year 2009 there were 126 juveniles offered the Youth Aid Panel Program option, resulting in 84 cases completed and 31 of the cases still in the program. The Haverford Township Youth Aid Panel Program has been recognized by the Delaware County Center for Resolutions as a model panel for other panels throughout Delaware and Chester Counties to emulate. In 2009 Steve Kupsov, co-chairperson the Haverford Township Youth Aid Panel, was recognized in Harrisburg for his dedication to the Youth Aid Panel.

The Detective Division also fingerprinted 152 citizens who need this service as a part of their pre-employment requirements for employment with Federal agencies, child care, teachers, securities exchange, etc. There were 164 background checks completed for other agencies such as the Armed Forces, Federal Government, State Government or local Government. In 2009 there were 241 Firearm permit background checks conducted at the request of the Delaware County Sheriff's Department. The Detectives also conducted 13 extensive pre-employment background investigations for the position of Police Officer.

## Special Operations Unit

**Due to the changing** nature of the world in general and police work in particular, providing quality law enforcement services goes beyond the "beat cop". The Special Operations Unit (SOU) is responsible for many facets in the overall operation of the Police Department. The Unit is staffed by 1 Sergeant and 4 Officers and allows the Department flexibility in deploying officers of the unit for special events, conducting training or other administrative functions without depleting the resources of the regular patrol unit.

One of the primary responsibilities of the SOU is fatal (and near fatal) crash investigations, crashes involving police cars, hit-and-run crashes or any other extraordinary crash. Specialized equipment used in those investigations includes Laser Technology's LTI 200 laser measuring device and CAD Zone's CrashZone diagramming software. All members of the Unit have completed the basic fatal crash investigation classes, and at least one advanced crash investigation class.

In an attempt to prevent crashes, members of the Unit utilize the three E's - Engineering, Education and Enforcement. The engineering facet consists of conducting traffic surveys and making recommendations concerning traffic patterns and restrictions, i.e., traffic calming. The education facet finds Unit members attending community meetings and listening to their concerns, offering a variety of solutions and working with the Township to complete the task. The enforcement facet is the extremely focused solution to crash prevention. By issuing a citation, the goal of the police officer is to prevent the reoccurrence of a potentially dangerous behavior. The Department participated in two specialized programs, Buckle-Up PA & Smooth Operator, that received both federal and state funding. The primary focus of Buckle-Up is seatbelt usage, and encompasses both education and enforcement portions of the program. Smooth Operator is targeted toward aggressive driving behaviors, and is strictly an enforcement program. During these programs, contact was made with drivers, and officers issued 1,051 citations.

**The Operation Safe Streets Program** was instituted by the SOU in 2009. The aim is to improve the livability of neighborhood streets by “calming” or regulating the impact of vehicular traffic. When streets are safe and pleasant, the quality of life is enhanced. When traffic problems become a daily occurrence, they threaten one’s senses of community and personal well being. Operation Safe Streets is about livability in one’s neighborhood. The program allows the citizens of Haverford Township to address quality of life issues such as stop sign violations, speeding, cut-through traffic, and the illegal parking of vehicles.

The Department also received a grant from The Department of Transportation to form The Northern Delaware County Driving under the Influence Task Force. The Department is responsible for coordinating six area departments in conducting DUI Check Points and the training of officers concerning DUI related issues.

Officers assigned to the SOU also conduct firearms training for the Police Department, as well as other training required by the State and Department. They conducted over 1,570 officer-hours of firearms training and qualification. Intra-departmental training found officers in a classroom for over 1,000 hours consisting primarily of First Aid/CPR and Less Lethal Weapons. Our Officers attended over 6,555 hours of instruction both in house and outside of the Department in various disciplines related to their responsibilities.

**Additional duties of the SOU include:** Maintaining certifications; repairing or facilitating the repair of equipment, from VASCAR units to flashlights; disposition of seized registrations and driver's licenses; investigation and disposition of abandoned vehicles; conduct traffic studies for volume and speed; specialized traffic enforcement e.g., commercial motor vehicles; car seat checks and installation as well as acting as Quartermaster.

## Community Policing Unit

**The mission** of the Haverford Township Police Department Community Policing Unit is to provide information to the public so it can be informed of current crime trends and have a basic understanding of how to reduce their risk of victimization.

The Community Policing Unit is comprised of one (1) Sergeant and two (2) Patrol Officers. The members of the unit are all Certified Crime Prevention Specialists. Members of this unit provide support to the Patrol Division and Detective Unit, as well as the community. It works closely with the residential, commercial and industrial communities and develops strategies that promote proactive community problem solving and crime prevention.

**The foundation** of a successful community policing strategy is the close, interactive relationship between officers and community members working toward the goal of reducing crime and its effects. Efforts focus on the underlying causes of crime by assessing the characteristics of problems in specific neighborhoods and the application of appropriate, mutually supported problem-solving remedies in a partnership role.

Crime prevention officers work closely with all community groups such as Local Civic Associations, Optimist Clubs, Rotary Club, Church groups, Boys and Girl Scout troops and Neighborhood organizations with Community based safety presentations and programs. Additionally the unit is responsible for presenting a wide range of safety and education programs to students in the Haverford Township School District and Parochial Schools.

**The most notable** accomplishment for the Community Policing Unit was the implementation of Operation Keep Safe a program to reduce underage drinking and dangerous behavior.

In an effort to reduce underage and dangerous behavior along with random acts of vandalism and disorderly behavior the Haverford Township Police Department

applied for and received a state funded grant to initiate programs to reduce these community issues. This enforcement effort began early August and as a part of this funding Operation Keep Safe was instituted.

As a part of Operation Keep Safe, the department established and will utilize a newly created enforcement program. This program named P.L.E.A.S.E. (Problematic Location Enforcement And Site Evaluation) uses two officers specifically trained in the area of underage and dangerous drinking. These officers target predetermined problem areas for saturation enforcement. The department established a “Zero Tolerance” for Township park ordinance and curfew violations, along with liquor law and drug violations. Officers stop any and all persons found in township parks, playgrounds and school properties after posted hours. Persons found to be in violation of ordinances and posted signs are cited.

This effort was put in place as a result of numerous complaints from citizens to help reduce the amount of acts of vandalism, nuisance crimes, disorderly conduct that have been reported in these areas.

**The Community Policing Unit** officers also provided the following programs throughout 2009;

## Police Motorcycles

**An additional responsibility** of the CPU is the coordination of the police department motorcycle officers and events. The department purchased four (4) 2009 Harley-Davidson Electra-Glide motorcycles as replacements for the previously owned motorcycle which ranged from five to seven years old. The new Harley-Davidson have several factory installed features such as Anti-Lock braking systems (ABS) and a larger rear tire providing enhanced safety for motor officers. The motorcycles are utilized in many various aspects of police work however they are primarily used for traffic enforcement and routine patrol. The department also provides police motorcycle escorts and traffic control for visiting dignitaries, large funerals, parades and special events.

During 2009 Haverford Police Department Motorcycle Officers were invited to participate with the Philadelphia Police Department Motorcycle Drill Team at their annual Thrill Show held at the Wachovia center. We also assisted with the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner deliveries to families of fallen officers throughout the Philadelphia area. Haverford Township Police Department Motorcycles assisted with several funerals of Police Officers killed in the line of duty, including the ceremony held in Bethlehem for Sgt. Mark Renniger, who was one of the four, Lakewood WA. Police Officers shot and killed while on duty.

**In April of 2009**, the department increased the number of Motor Officers by one. Officer Harvey Pike attended and successfully completed the Basic Police Motorcycle Operators. This course is an intensive 2-week basic motorcycle police officers training course, focusing on ten practical exercises that stress low-speed maneuverability, evasion techniques, and high-speed braking skills, students spend approximately 90% of the course "in the saddle." They are given practical exercises and riding instruction supplemented with classroom instruction and demonstrations of tactical techniques.

This intensive 80-hour program develops the coordination, skills and confidence necessary for officers to operate a police motorcycle safely and efficiently. Some of the topics covered include: Addressing the needs of individual officers and their Departments, machine nomenclature, slow speed maneuvering, control braking, curve negotiation, motorcycle maintenance, defensive driving techniques and law enforcement techniques. The training provides the police officers with the confidence and skills required to ensure their safety and to utilize the motorcycle to enhance public safety. Officers who successfully complete the course receive a certificate of completion along with Motor Wings to be worn on their uniform. Haverford Township is fortunate to have two Motor Officers certified as instructors. Sergeant Michael Glenn and Officer John Esher have been certified through Northwestern University and Harley-Davidson as Basic Police Motorcycle Operator Instructors.

## Parking Enforcement

**The Parking Enforcement Office** is under the direction of the Sergeant of the Community Policing Unit and is responsible for all of the school crossings within the Township as well as parking meter enforcement. The office is staffed by one secretary and five part time parking enforcement officers.

Throughout the township are 416 parking meters, these meters are located within five different municipal parking lots and curbside parking spaces at several different business districts. These meters are maintained and serviced by Parking Enforcement Officers, who are also responsible for the coin collection from these meters.

There were a total of 3,730 parking tickets issued in 2009. Parking Enforcement Officers issued 2,266 of those parking tickets. Collections from meters totaled \$96,566.90. This amount was a decrease from the 2008 amount of \$100,759.35. The police department municipal parking lot sticker sales totaled \$8,241.000 which is a decrease from the 2008 amount of \$11,163.00. Fines collected for parking violation citations totaled \$44,415.00 in 2009, which was an increase from \$43,010.00 in 2008.

## Critical Incident Team (CIT)

The Critical Incident Team is a specialized group of highly trained officers that are utilized by this department to respond to the most dangerous and critical incidents in the township and surrounding jurisdictions when requested. These officers are divided among two teams; the Special Response Team and the Crisis Negotiations Team.

### Special Response Team

The Special Response Team is the department's tactical team. The officers that comprise the Special Response Team are all highly trained and motivated officers who are tasked with resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized weapons and tactics.

In 2009 the SRT continued to hone their tactical skills by participating in Delaware County's Community Preparedness Program. This year's program, which is coordinated through the Delaware County District Attorney's office, focused on a multi jurisdictional training effort called the Corridor Counter Terrorism Exercise. The exercise brought the county's various police tactical

teams, bomb squad, Federal Bureau of Investigations, Coast Guard, Philadelphia and Marcus Hook Marine Units together to train at high value locations that may be targeted by foreign or domestic terrorists.

The police department is able to utilize four current officers as certified instructors in various police sciences pertaining to tactical operations. Sergeant Joseph Hagan along with Patrol Officers John Esher and Stephen Birney are certified NRA firearms instructors. Officer Michael Flynn is an internationally recognized instructor in Tactical Team Development receiving his certification from Heckler & Koch International Training Division. These certifications allow the department to develop and provide high quality in-house training to enhance and expand the Special Response Teams capabilities. These trainings are coordinated through the Special Operations Sergeant, Sergeant Joseph Hagan.

This year the Special Response Team as a group and individually received over 1160 hours of specialized training. The training consisted of practice in basic tactical movement, firearms, less than lethal weapons, and specialized tools including hazmat suits, distraction devices and deployment of chemical agents. The team was activated four times throughout the year, for various incidents. The team was successful in completing each mission.

### Crisis Negotiation Team

The police department also maintains a Crisis Negotiation Team. The Crisis Negotiation Team is responsible for resolving critical incidents through the use of specialized negotiation tactics. The team is coordinated by Sergeant Shant Bedrossian. The team was activated four times throughout 2009.

All the members of the Crisis Negotiation Team have received training from the Federal Bureau of Investigations along with the Law Enforcement Officers Training School in basic crisis negotiations. Several of the team members have also received training in Advanced Negotiations and Specialized Negotiations from the Federal Bureau of Investigations and the Law Enforcement Officers Training School.

The Crisis Negotiations Team regularly attends the Federal Bureau of Investigations conference on negotiations held in Baltimore Maryland. This conference covers the newest techniques and trends in resolving critical incidents.

The team also conducts regular in-house and scenario based training to enhance the readiness of the negotiations team. In 2009 the Crisis Negotiations Team was able to conduct joint training with the Special Response Team to provide real world practice in resolving critical incidents. This joint training allowed officers the opportunity to deploy and resolve a scenario driven incident giving them practical hands on experience.

## Staff Services Division

The Staff Services Division is the information center within the police department. The division is commanded by one Lieutenant and comprised of two units, the Records Unit and the Information Assistant Office. The division has one Sergeant assigned who leads eleven civilian personnel.

### The Records Unit

The Records Unit is a component of the Staff Services Division. It is staffed by both police and civilian personnel who are committed to providing professional service to the public. It maintains all reports generated by the officers; which includes arrest reports, incident reports, crash reports, citations (traffic and non-traffic) and parking tickets. It also coordinates with the courts in scheduling hearings for the officers.

**In 2009 the Records Unit** provided information from over 20,000 police events to persons requesting information. The unit processed over 3,700 parking tickets and was responsible for the billing of over ninety-five chargeable alarms that required a police response. These alarms totaled \$28,500.00 worth of fines.

## 2009 Statistical Reporting

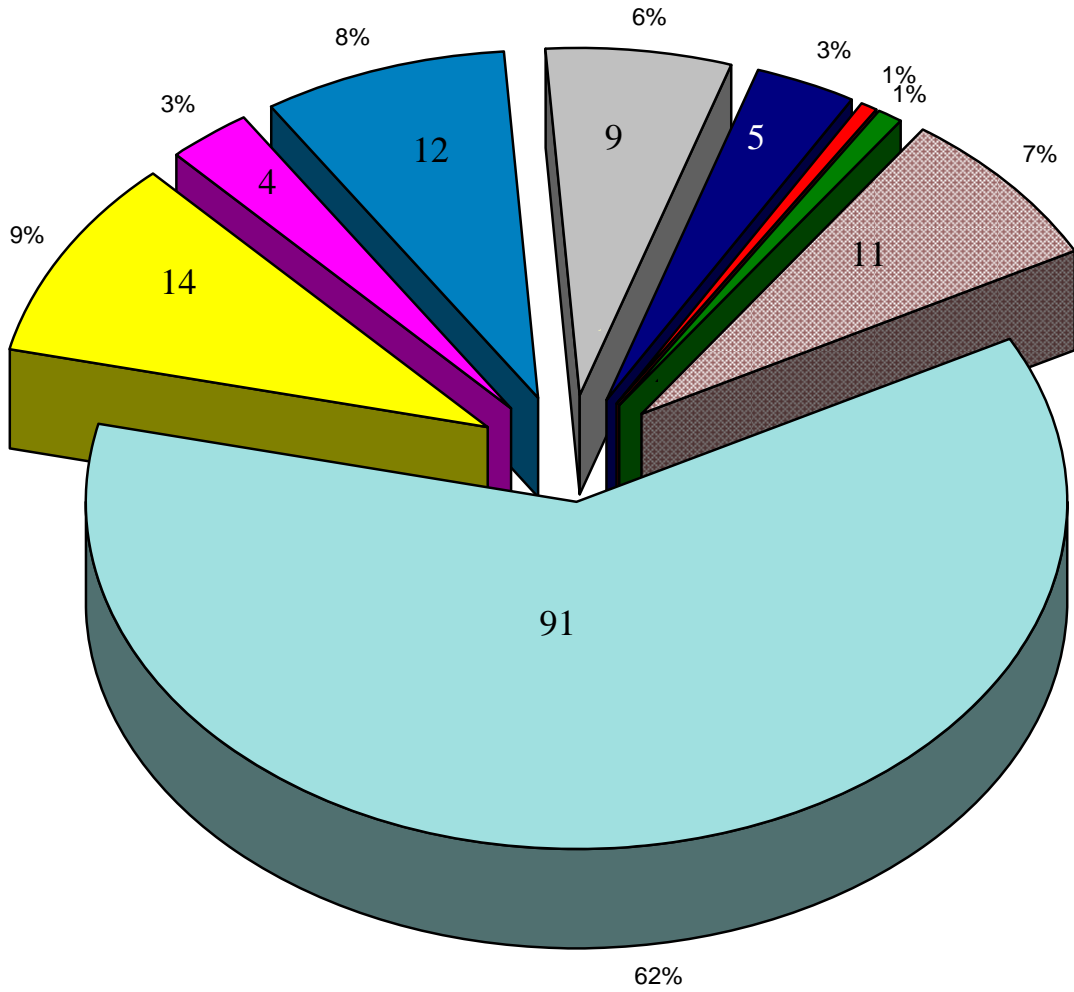

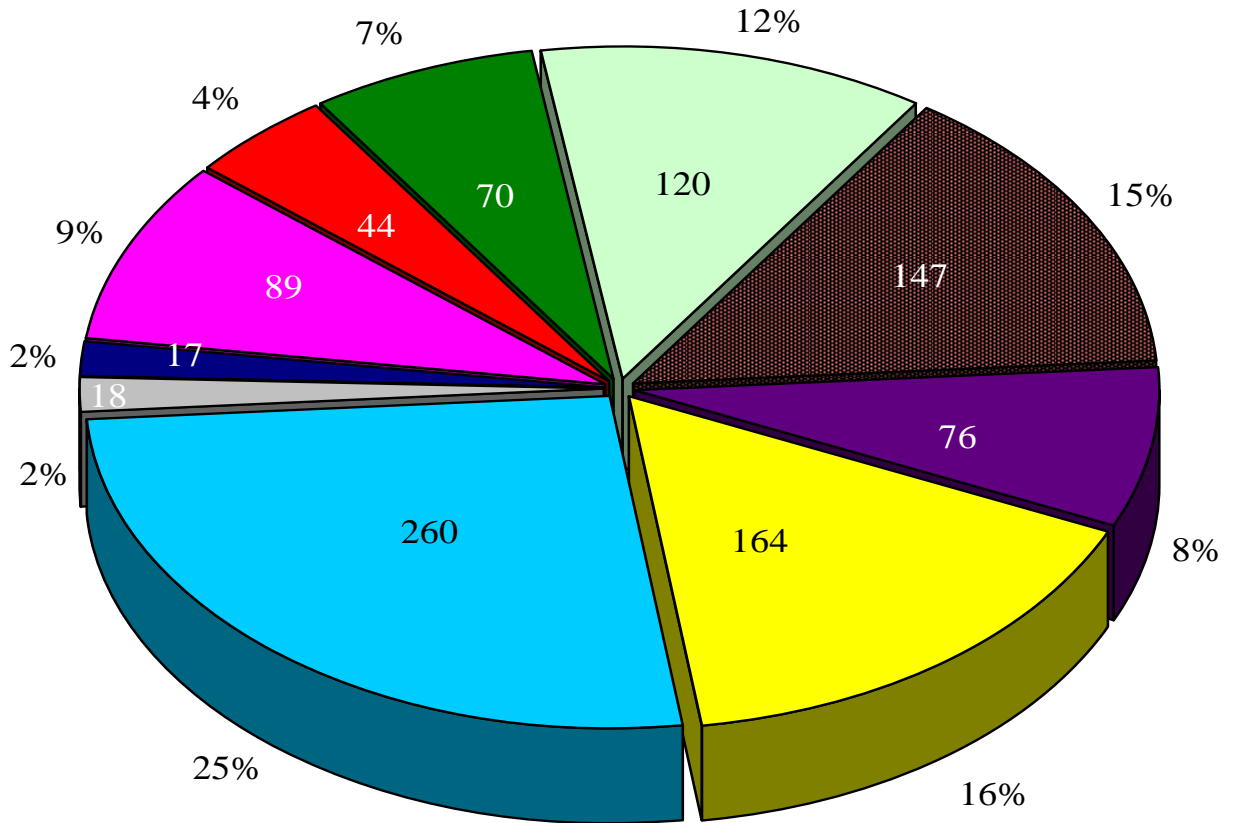

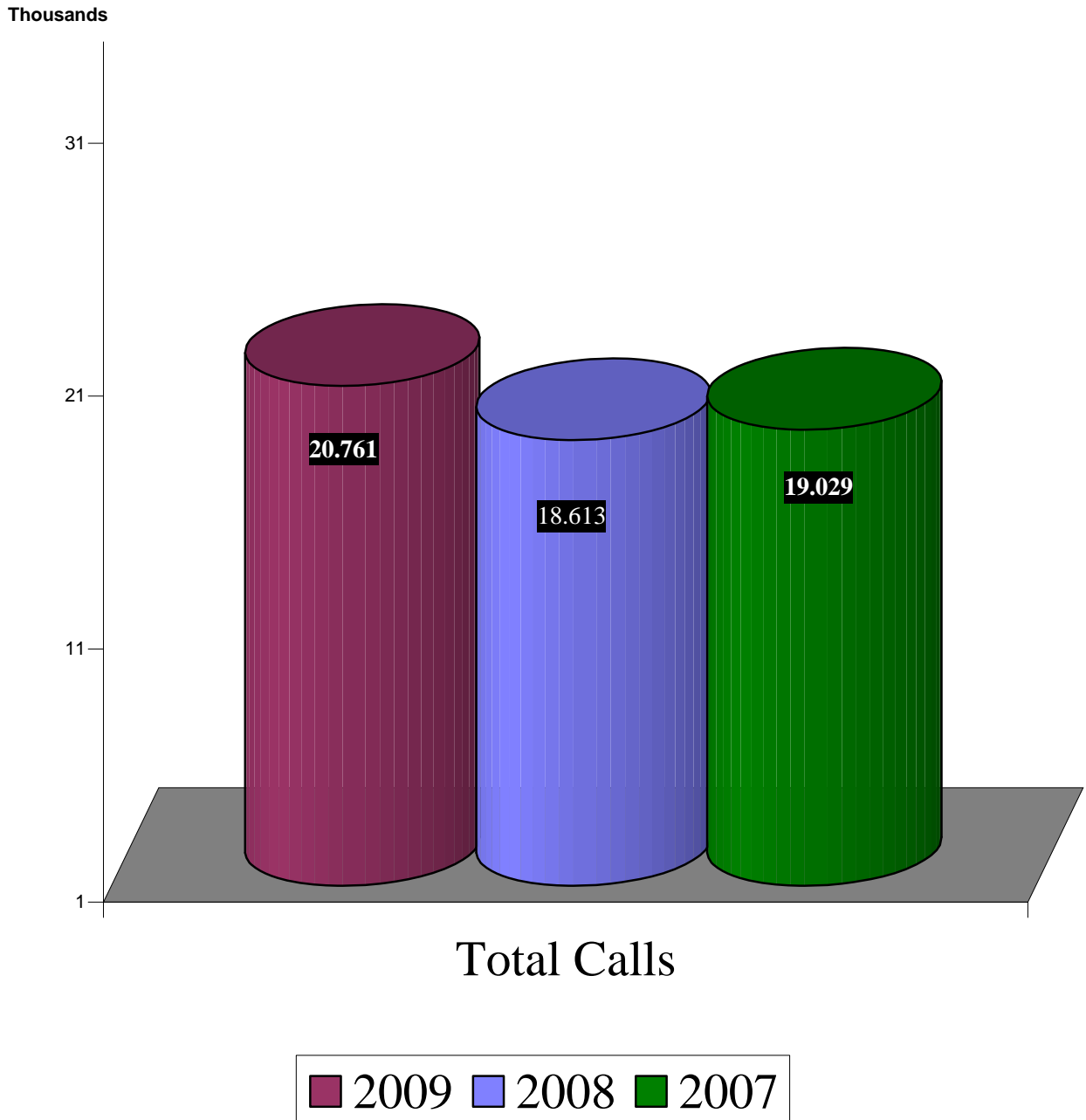

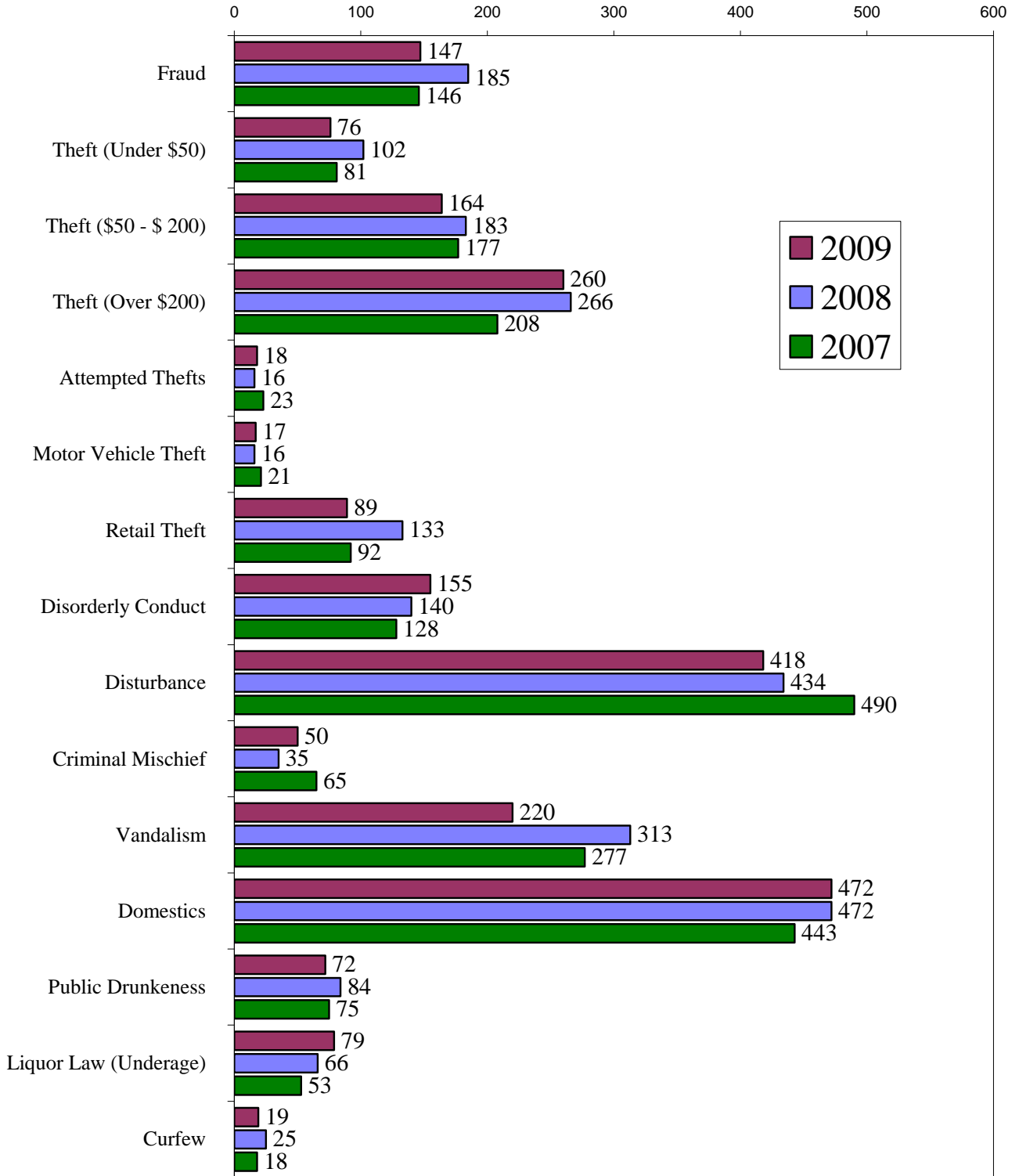
## All Crimes Three Year Comparison

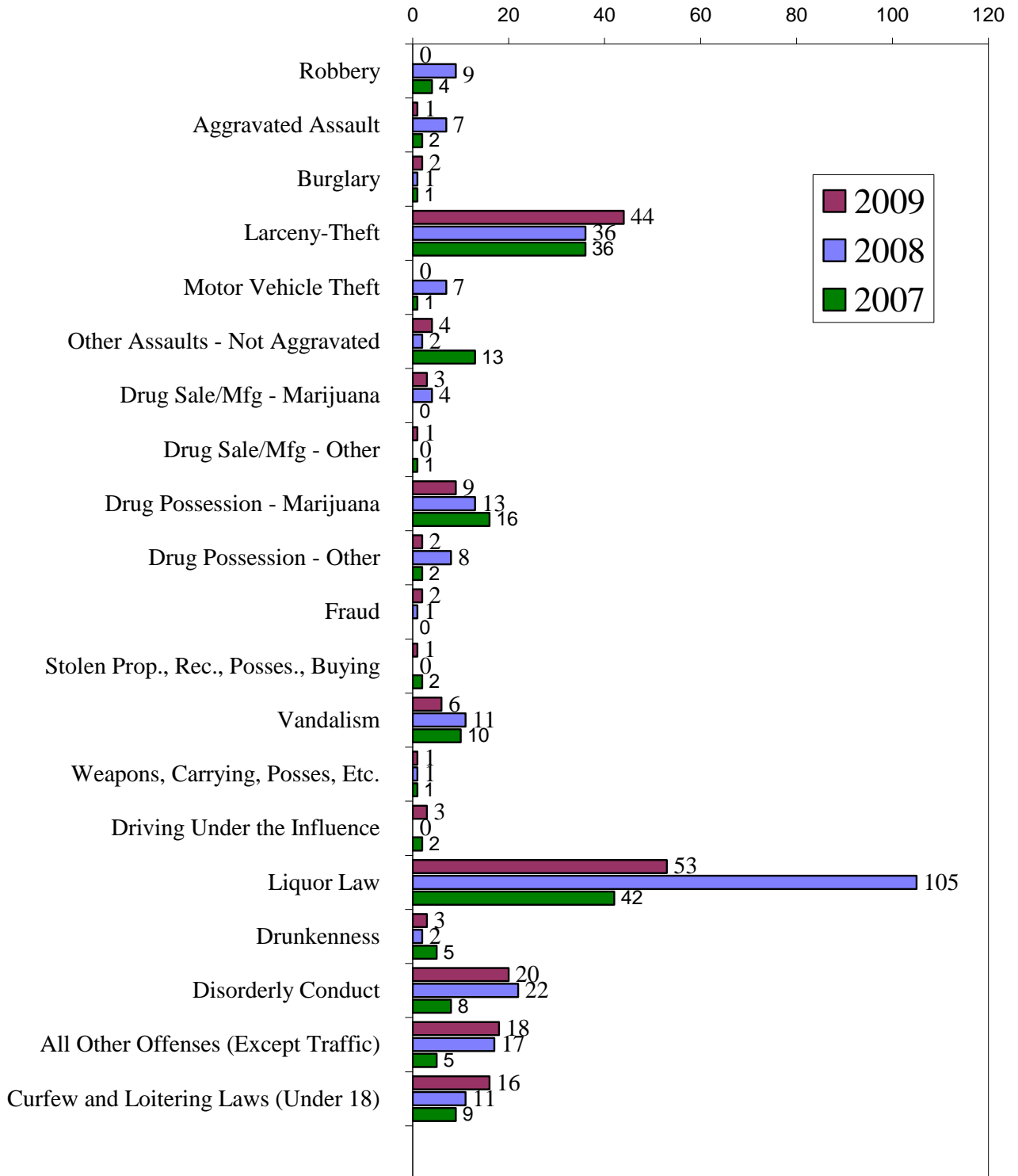

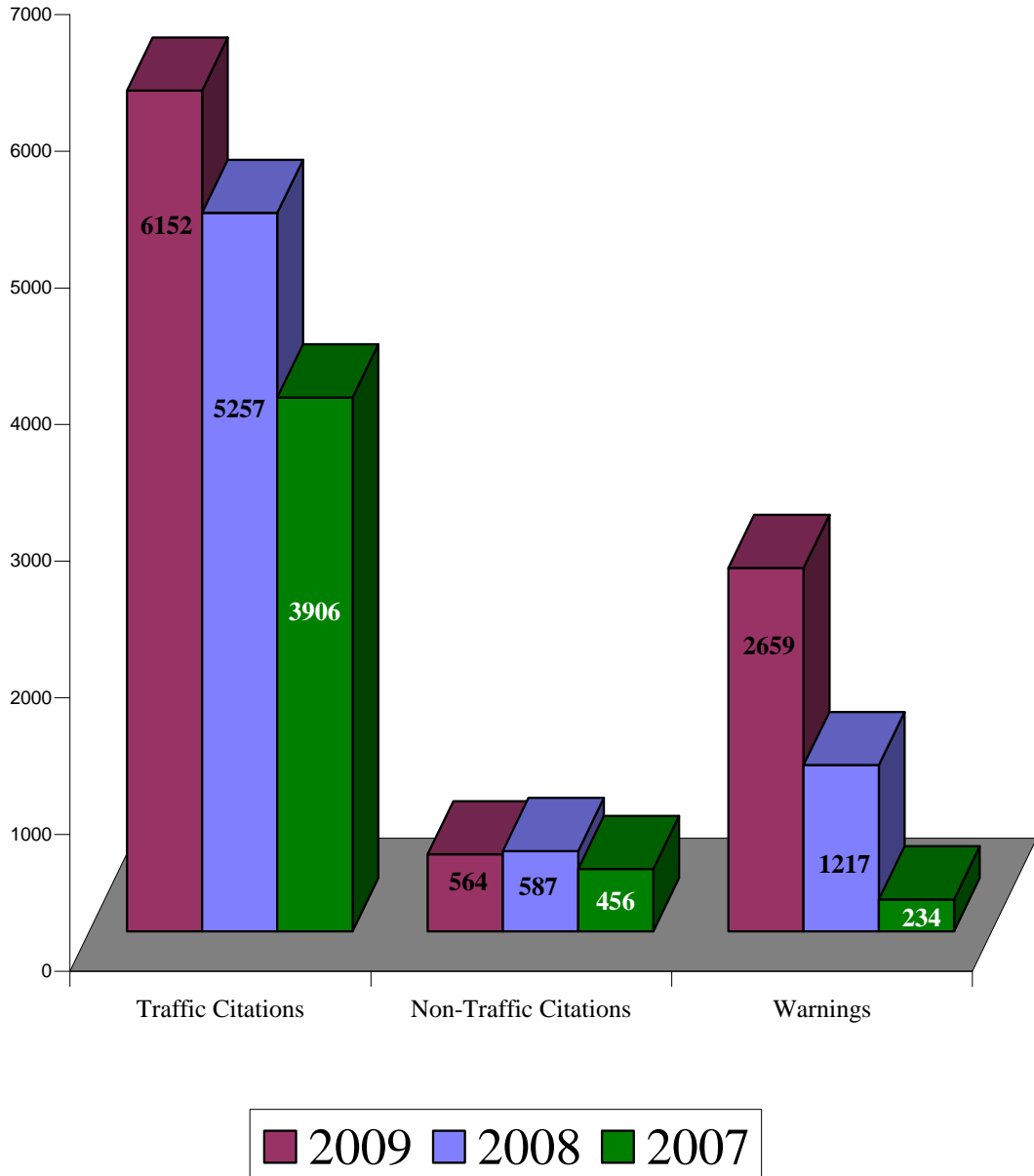

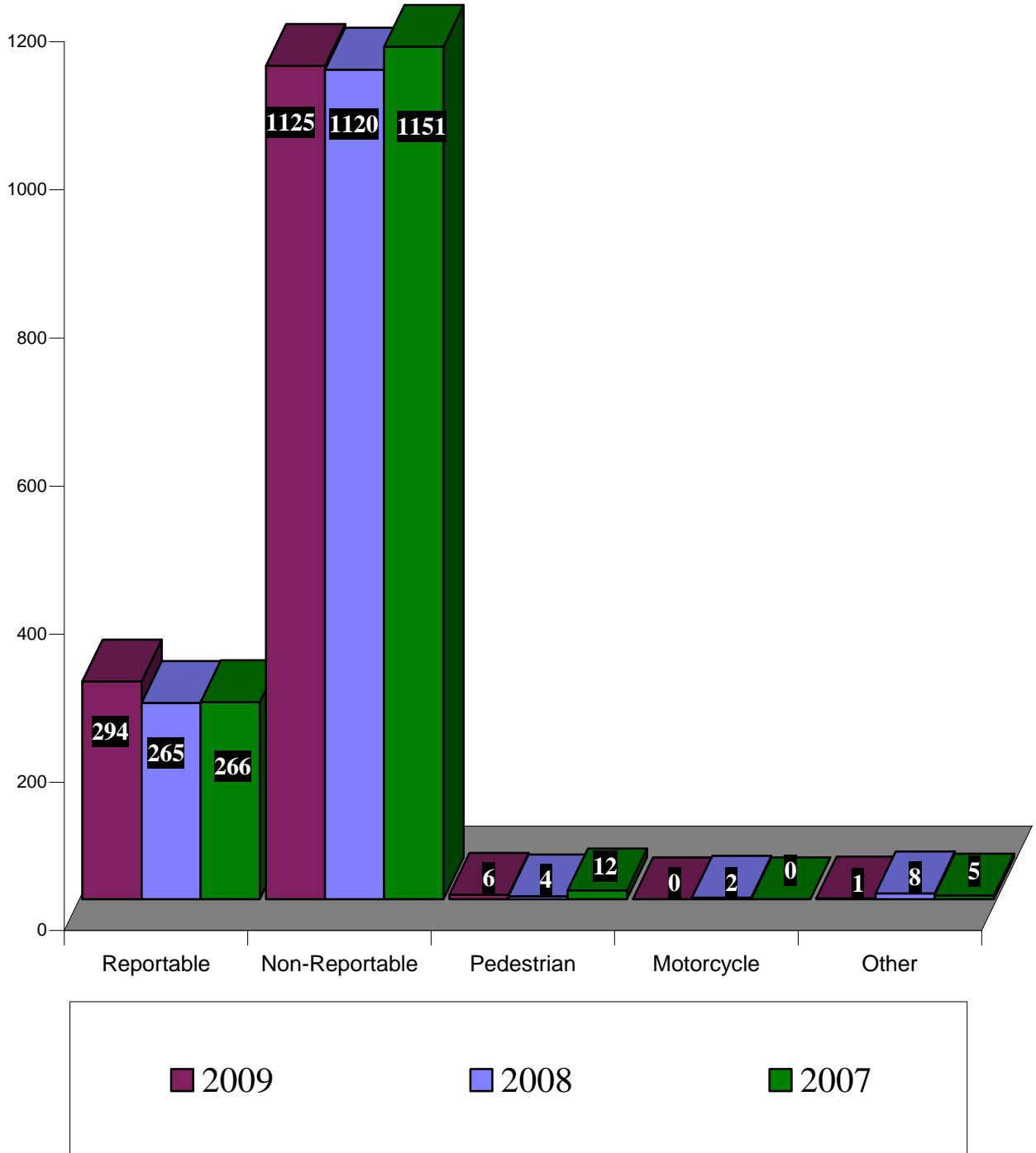
